Suddenly, Gavin feels severe pain and numbness and has a decreased range of motion in his left arm. His mother immediately calls the Dr. Robertson. It is recommended that Gavin increase ice and elevation. The next day, Gavin says pain is unbearable and is getting little relief. Gavin's mother takes him to the emergency room, due to extreme swelling of his hand and forearm (Appendix B).

When Gavin arrives at the emergency room, his arm is swollen and his fingers are cool and purple. It is determined that there was a complication in the resetting of the fracture and he has developed acute compartment syndrome. Surgery is required immediately.

- 2. What are the connective tissue wrappings? Why are they important?
